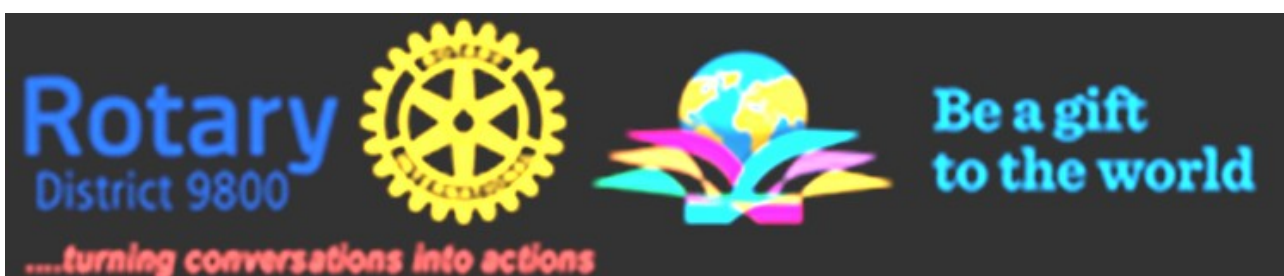

## February is Rotary Peace and Conflict Prevention/ Resolution Month

It seems that in the world today the role of Rotary to take a position of facilitation for peace is just so important. But how will this happen? Several District and club signature programs could in fact be seen as precursors for world peace.

Our District has an unbroken record of providing participants in the **Rotary World Peace Fellows Program**. At this time Peace Scholar Ellen Maynes is currently in Thailand and is participating in classes at the Rotary Peace Centre at Chulalongkorn University.



The Rotary Peace Centre is a fantastic facility with the university a lush oasis compared to the chaos of Bangkok traffic and high-rise buildings. There are twenty other students participating in the program this year from around the globe - all have very diverse experience and credentials. Ellen has met her Host Counsellor from a local Thai Rotary Club and will get an opportunity to speak at hopefully several meetings. She has made contact with the Australian Embassy in Bangkok and has shared information about the peace program. In late January she was to visit the Mae Sot Refugee Camp on the Thai/Myanmar border and in March will travel to Nepal. It will be interesting to follow Ellen's adventures and to see just how much her life changes as a result of the District 9800 commitment to the Rotary World Peace Fellows program.

The **Rotary International Convention** is another great opportunity to immerse yourself in the diversity of cultures in Rotary. I am attending the Convention in Seoul and I would love to have your company. I, along with some twenty one Rotarians and partners who have registered, will have the chance to mingle in harmony, with an expected 50,000 people from all continents and learn more about the fabric of our organisation that embodies peaceful solution to significant world problems. I will be participating in three kilometre **Walk for Peace** down the main street of Seoul and will proudly wave the Australian flag.



Our District has four remarkable younger Rotarians attending the **Youth Summit in Seoul**. Amanda Wendt and Nicole Lake from Melbourne Park Rotary, Himanshu Kaushik from Essendon North Rotary and Robert Foran from Echuca Moama Rotary will be attending a program for future Rotary Leaders prior to the start of the Convention. They will then take on a Volunteer role and participate in the Convention and be involved in a service project. They are sponsored by District 9800, hosted whilst in Korea, and I have asked them to bring back an idea to implement in our District.

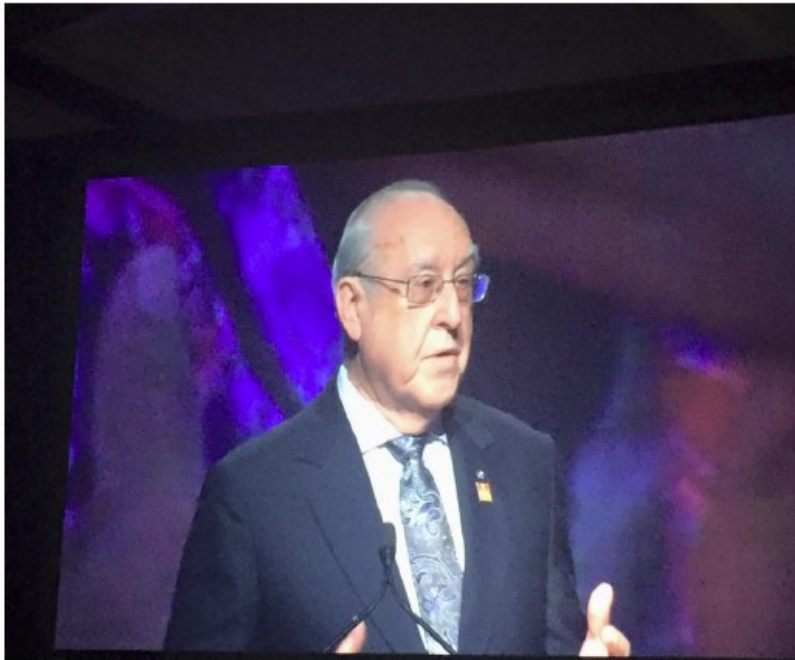

Every year Rotary International holds an Assembly for District Governor's Elect and their spouses, in San Diego California USA. The Assembly is a weeklong motivational training meeting where approximately 530 DG'S E from all over the world come together to prepare for the coming year.



Because every governor-elect will attend, it is an opportunity to exchange ideas and connect with Rotarians from around the world. The connections often become partnerships for service projects and cultural exchanges.



The program for Governor's Elect comprises both general plenary sessions and small group sessions. The general sessions include inspirational speeches from people such as the RI president-elect, The Rotary Foundation trustee chair-elect, and Rotary's general secretary. The small group sessions provide an opportunity to go over our respective plans for the upcoming year and discover new ideas and strategies from other participants. Although the International Assembly program varies from year to year, common topics include The Rotary Foundation, public image and membership.

Separate breakout sessions are also held for spouses and partners where they discuss a variety of topics related to Rotary service projects, the Rotary Foundation and how it serves humanity. Rebecca is very much part of the Governor journey and along the way has expressed her amazement at the breadth of the humanitarian work done by Rotary clubs.

RIPE John Germ also announced the theme for the next Rotary year, 'Rotary Serving Humanity'. Well done John on choosing another robust statement of what Rotary is all about. As we have much more to do this year to 'Be a Gift to the World', I will be limiting my discussions on next year's theme for now to the upcoming President's Elect training sessions.

## 6 social media resolutions that can improve your club's exposure

Maybe you spent much of last year banging away on social media to gain exposure for your club (because everyone says you should), but you felt like you were getting nowhere fast. It's still early in the year. Why not take a step back, make an honest assessment of your approach, and determine what you could do better. Here are six social media resolutions I think you should make this year to elevate your club's social media exposure.

**1. Be consistent – Post regularly and often.** You won't build a solid social media presence by posting every once and a while. If you are using Facebook, Instagram, Flickr, or Pinterest, post at least once a week. For Twitter, every one to two days is key.

**2. Develop a social media schedule** – Manage your time by planning your club social media activity in advance. Since you can schedule your Facebook posts days or weeks ahead of time, take advantage of this ability. You will quickly find managing your club Facebook page will become a lot easier and feel less ad hoc.

**3. Mix it up** – Look at how you can use new and different social media platforms, or different types of content, to engage your audience and promote the good things your club is doing. Why not shoot an enticing video for membership recruitment? Or pose a question, such as "What was one thing you found interesting about this week's speaker?"

**4. Develop a strategy** – If your club is still using social media without a strategy, stop! A strategy will give your social media exposure purpose and identify the benefits to your club. Each social network has its own features, strengths, and best practices. But you want to make sure people are getting a cohesive message of what your club is about across all platforms. Start by defining goals and objectives. That will help you define your audience, choose the right platform, and determine your message.

- \* Do you want increased event participation?

- \* New members?

- \* Increased traffic to your website?

- \* To build an online community?

- \* What will success look like? What can you measure?

**5. Establish guidelines** – Dealing with the do's and don't of social media can be a minefield, so chart a path through it by creating a social media policy. Decide who can and will share online, who has password and login information, and who can be a backup if the main person is on holiday. Set clear boundaries for what you are going to share. If in doubt, get ideas from social media policies of other organizations. And make a crisis plan: what happens in the event of a PR emergency?

**6. Have FUN** – This is the most important resolution and one you should try to stick to. Use your social media platforms to let a little bit of personality shine through and share with your audience a mix of interesting, entertaining, humorous, or helpful content relevant to your club and community.

While it can seem overwhelming, social media is the best Rotary promotional tool for building strong relationships and engaging with your community. If you set yourself some achievable goals this year, you and your club will reap the rewards.

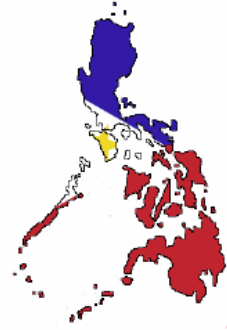

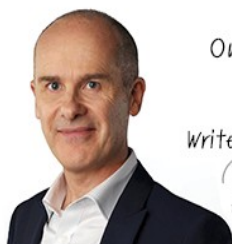
