A change of venue this week with breakfast at the Crown Street Stables instead of Quest. Delicious coffee, yummy toasties and good company.

It was very interesting to hear from Dr Fiona McDonald from Victoria University about her research into the efficacy of Breakfast Clubs in schools. This program funded by the Victorian Government in 2016 for \$15.7 million targeted 500 mainly primary schools, but also included some Special Schools and P-12 schools for their primary allocation. <https://www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/breakfastclubs.aspx>

Fiona interviewed Principals, teachers, parents and students on their opinions, aiming to identify success criteria, changes in student attendance, attitudes to schools, achievement and social interactions. Her findings from these 3 years of work were that the programs varied in their delivery, the number of days a week breakfast was supplied, staffing and supervision and acceptance by students in need.

One of the greatest issues was storage of the food supplied {deliveries once a term}. Food is supplied from FoodBank and is mainly 'long life' products. There also were concerns that there was stigma associated with the breakfasts and that not all children who needed them were attending.

A positive was having staff supervising the program and encouraging social interactions. Some schools utilised volunteers—parents, grandparents or others, or support staff. This was dependent on the 'buy in' from the Principal and school in general {although only schools identified through the Student Family Occupation Index were targeted}.

While the underlying belief that children needed food and learnt better when not hungry was a basis, the supply of breakfast was not the only benefit obtained. Fiona also reported that many of the elements she was focussing on did not have a baseline record to work from, or schools could not supply this. Overall the School Breakfast Program was positively received.

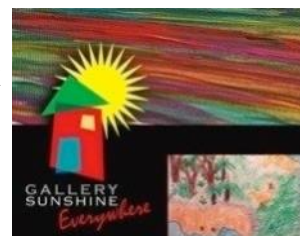

## Rotary International President Barry Rassin

### February 2019

In my travels over the past year, I've visited many strong, vibrant clubs and districts that are transforming their communities. When I attend their meetings, I can feel the energy. When I meet their members, I can see they are people of action. And when I look at their communities, I can recognize the impact of their work.

I've also visited communities with Rotary clubs that were hardly more than social clubs. It shouldn't ever be that way. Fortunately, there's a simple approach that I believe can help revitalize any club.

I'd like to challenge every Rotary club to come up with at least one high-impact service project. Each club already has the potential, the resources, to make it happen. It has the power to change people's lives — completely.

It doesn't take millions of dollars. One of the most transformational projects I've been a part of involved providing a Jeep to a group of midwives in Haiti. We had asked the midwives what we could do for them, and they told us they needed a way to reach expectant mothers in a remote part of the country. We supplied a Jeep, painted it pink, and put the Rotary logo on it. Three years later, we went back to see how they were doing. They were excited by the outcomes: They told us that the mortality rate for mothers and infants in that region had dropped by 50 percent.

That's what I call transformational service.

But Jeeps don't last forever, and after eight years on the road, that vehicle was on its last legs. So we bought a pink Land Cruiser. It's still on the road, allowing the midwives to provide prenatal care to women in that remote region.

What makes a project transformational?

It doesn't have to involve a lot of money, but it has to reach people and have a major impact in the community. That is the key, and that is where careful planning and thorough research come in. So do your research. Leverage your resources. Seek partnerships that can increase your impact. And then take action.

Of course, service is only part of what a strong club must offer. It must also have good speakers, provide leadership development, involve Rotaract and Interact, and bring value to its members and reasons to participate in Rotary events.

If your club is transformational and well-organized, everything else will follow. Members will be engaged, and new members will be eager to join you. Fundraising will be easier: People love to give when they see how their money is making a difference and when they know the organization is accountable. Your club will be vibrant, relevant, and alive — and it will *Be the Inspiration* to those within its ranks as well as to the community it serves.

### Rotary Community Medical Equipment Recycling Program

At some stage in life many of us will need medical equipment in the home or for mobility. Often we only need the equipment for a limited time; until we get well or move from home when we need more assistance.

We have a great Health Care System in Australia, but unfortunately some people fall through the cracks and need Medical Equipment they can't afford to buy. Your local Rotary Clubs are committed to helping disadvantaged people and helping our planet by reducing waste. Rotary Volunteers collect surplus medical equipment, refurbish it and make it available to Medical Professionals for their disadvantaged clients, for free.

If you have surplus medical equipment in good condition it can be used to help someone else have a better life. Until now most of this equipment would become landfill.

### Rotary Hospital Medical Equipment Re-issue Program

It is common for people who leave hospital to need medical equipment in their home and for mobility. Unfortunately many people have to hire or buy the material they need as it is not covered by health insurance. Other people who may be eligible for medical equipment support often have to wait for months before they receive it.

#### ***Some people who desperately need medical equipment can't afford to buy it.***

Rotary Clubs have partnered with Sunshine Hospital and have established a Re-issue Store in the hospital which stocks recycled equipment that is made available to help disadvantage patients.

### Rotary Home Care Medical Equipment Re-issue Program

A similar problem exists for elderly people living at home. The amount of support that any Government can provide is finite and at this vulnerable stage of life some people can't afford the equipment they need. Rotary has formed a partnership with local medical groups who provide in home medical care. They have access to recycled medical equipment stored at the Rotary Donations In Kind Store in West Footscray.

#### ***Both Re-issue Programs provide the equipment they receive from the Recycling Program, to people in genuine need, for free.***

### Examples of people that your donation will help

#### **Jan could be one of your friends.**

She is a single mother as a result of her husband's death, leaving her to look after her children on her own. She can't go back to work until she recovers and has used all of her sick leave. She just found out that her health insurance does not cover the medical equipment she requires at home, to aid her recovery. At a time when she is most vulnerable, your donation will provide the support she deserves.



Let's call him Tom. He has worked all his life but there have been a few problems along the way. He lives on his own and up to now he has managed to get by. As a result of a fall, combined with the passing years he needs medical equipment in his home and to move around that he can't afford to hire or buy.



#### ***Many women are in similar situations.***

*They have spent most of their lives raising families and caring for others. In their twilight years there is no super to rely on and little money in the bank.*



### Rotary Medical Equipment Recycling and Re-issue Programs

**Material Required:** Generally all of the medical equipment that someone needs in the home or for mobility can be recycled and given to someone who can't afford to buy the equipment they need.

The equipment needs to be in good working order and as a guide "would you use it or give it to a member of your family?" The volunteers who run the program have the capacity to handle minor refurbishment and to replace things like worn tyres and rubber stoppers, but can't handle significant repairs.

**Collection:** Drop-off points have been established in your neighbourhood and if the goods will fit in a car it would be greatly appreciated if you deliver the equipment to one of them. If you can't deliver the goods Rotary volunteers will arrange for the collection.

Thank you on behalf of the people who will benefit from your generosity and thank you on behalf of our planet; **Recycling and Reuse are much better alternatives than landfill.**

Tilman is Co-President of International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War and founding international and Australian Chair of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN), awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2017 "for its work to draw attention to the catastrophic humanitarian consequences of any use of nuclear weapons and for its ground-breaking efforts to achieve a treaty-based prohibition of such weapons".

Tilman is Associate Professor in the Nossal Institute for Global Health, University of Melbourne; and international medical advisor for Australian Red Cross. He was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia "for service to the promotion of peace as an advocate for the abolition of nuclear weapons, and to public health through the promotion of immunisation programs in the South East Asia-Pacific region".

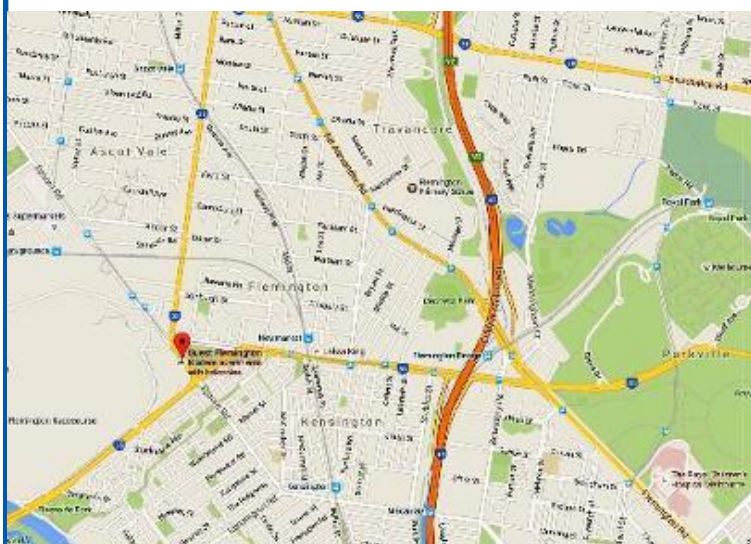

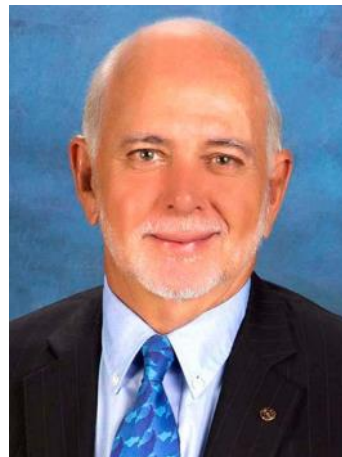
